Keynote: Drivers Changing the Textile Recycling and Reuse Supply Chain

Dr. Karen Leonas, Professor of NC State University/Wilson College of Textiles

Sustainability through the textile and apparel supply chain is critical and gaining increased attention globally. A number of producers, suppliers, brands and retailers are addressing current human rights issues and moving in directions to reduce environmental impact in design, material selection, production techniques, product use and disposal.

Today 85% of textile products are disposed of in the landfill; as awareness of reuse and alternate disposal methods increase, the flow of goods is expected to shift from landfill disposal. This will impact the reuse market including increased volume, shifts in fiber content and chemical use. This presentation will provide an overview of the market today, changes on the horizon,

pre-competitive collaborations in this space, and future technologies including closed loop initiatives.

# General Session: Panel Discussion — The Future of Textiles — Trends & New Developments
